How big is Pitcairn Island?

The four islands-- Pitcairn, Henderson, Ducie and Oeno --are scattered across several hundred kilometres of ocean and have a combined land area of about 47 square kilometres (18 square miles). Henderson Island accounts for 86% of the land area, but only Pitcairn Island is inhabited.
