

What is the energy strategy for Kosovo?

The Kosovo energy strategy includes increasing RES capacity to 35% of electricity consumption by 2031. Aiming for 600 MW wind, 600 MW solar PV, 20 MW biomass & at least 100 MW of prosumer capacity, to reach a total installed RES capacity of 1600 MW by 2031. Lignite exploitation in Kosovo started in 1922.

How much will Kosovo's new solar power plant cost?

In addition, procedures are scheduled to be announced in the fourth quarter for a solar power plant of 100 MW for government-controlled power utility Kosovo Energy Corp. (KEK) and a solar thermal system for district heating in Prishtina, according to Rizvanolli. The contracts will have a combined value of EUR 180 million, she added.

Does Kosovo have solar power?

Kosovo has the potential of capturing solar energy directly and converting it to electricity. The region of highest solar potential based on global horizontal irradiation is the southeastern part of Kosovo, centred around the city of Gjakova. Solar power is already used on the roofs of some buildings.

Will Kosovo use solar energy for district heating?

In late December 2022, Kosovo became the first country in the Western Balkans Economy to use solar energy for district heating. Kosovo's Minister of Finance, Labour and Transfers, Hekuran Murati, said the project would ensure access to the central heating system for about 38,000 citizens.

Why is electricity expensive in Kosovo?

Usually, in Kosovo the imported energy is much more expensive than export. This is because Kosovo imports energy one day before needed, in the other hand energy is exported during the night when the demands are under generating level. Imports and exports have a negative impact for electrical energy price.

Which companies are affecting the energy sector in Kosovo?

Besides government institutions, there are also companies with great impact in energy sector such as Kosovo Energy Corporation (KEK), Transmission, System and Market Operator (KOSTT) and Kosovo Electricity Distribution and Supply (KEDS). A lot of legislative documents that aim the adjustment of electricity sector have been approved.

Currently there are roughly 10 MW generated through small-scale solar energy projects. More projects are under development and this capacity is expected to ... Some 95 per cent of the energy currently used in Kosovo comes from burning coal, which is a major factor in air pollution. In a concept paper on renewable energy sources, Kosovo envisages decarbonizing its energy by 2030 by prioritizing green projects, environmental protection and reducing greenhouse gas emissions.

"Adding more renewable energy is critical for our green transition. And, most importantly, building a solid foundation for a bright and secure energy future," she stressed. It is the first auction of its kind in Kosovo*. The authorities "anticipate many more to come for both solar and wind energy development," Rizvanolli added.

To support the green transition in Kosovo*, the European Investment Bank (EIB) has signed a EUR33 million investment loan for the construction one of its largest solar photovoltaic plants near Pristina - with a capacity of up to 100 MWac (120MWp).

In 2024, Kosovo completed its first ever solar auction with winning bidder, the Orllati consortium, for a 100 MW solar park in Kramovik.. This groundbreaking solar auction ensured a transparent and level playing field for qualifying bidders and is a testimony to growing investor interest in Kosovo's vast renewable energy potential.

The plant is scheduled to begin commercial operations in 2022. No further details were revealed on the project. When built, the plant will be Kosovo's first large scale solar park. The Kosovar government has made several attempts to support small sized and utility scale solar in the past. These efforts, however, have produced little results to ...

To support the green transition in Kosovo*, one of its largest solar photovoltaic plants will be constructed on former ash dump fields near Pristina with a capacity of up to 100 MW. The electricity sector in Kosovo is almost entirely dependent on coal-fired power plants.

It would be Kosovo's first wind power auction. Targets from the energy strategy include a 35% share of renewables in electricity consumption. Also, the government aims to add 1.2 GW in wind and solar power capacity. It includes 100 MW in the prosumer segment, with an intermediary goal of 30 MW by 2025.

This will be the first large-scale solar photovoltaic plant in Kosovo and will increase installed capacities tenfold from 10.1 MW to 110.1 MW. As a result, the share of solar power in the energy mix of Kosovo will increase from 0.2% to 2.3%.
