The roadmap aims to help Uzbekistan formulate its strategies and plans for solar energy deployment across all levels of government.

It also includes provisions for installing rooftop solar panels in 37,000 households, each possibly selling surplus energy back to the grid. Under the decree's terms, the Government will purchase unused energy back from the consumer, paying 1,000 UZS for each unused kilowatt-hour.

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The government is aiming to significantly increase the share of renewables from 0.3 percent in 2016 in power production to up to 25 percent, while targeting to develop up to 5 gigawatts of solar power by 2030. Adding new power generation is likely to cost \$14.7 billion for Uzbekistan, requiring mobilization of all possible sources of funding.
